SOUTH AFRICA INCREASES FILING FEES 1ST JULY 2019; DISTINGUISHES BETWEEN CORPORATE & SMALL ENTITIES.

*Please note that the renewal fee amount payable will vary slightly depending on the annuity year of the patent or design.

In a first, the Patent Office will now distinguish fees paid by corporate entities and small, medium and micro entities (SMME), with a significant increase for the former.

A corporate entity is defined as one that does not qualify as an SMME in terms of the National Small Business Amendment Act, which stipulates that an SMME must, together with its branches or subsidiaries have:

- i) fewer than 100 employees (up to 200 in some industry sectors),
- ii) a turnover of less than a predetermined amount (currently set at between ZAR 4 million and ZAR 50 million, depending on the industry sector), and iii) total gross assets (excluding fixed property) valued at between ZAR 2 million and ZAR 18 million, again, depending on the industry sector. To pay fees at the SMME level, a new Declaration of Entity Status Form (Form P27 for patents and Form D19 for designs) must be submitted.

Effective 1st July, the said form must also be lodged when renewing an existing patent or design. Failure to file the required form will result in the corporate entity rates being applied.

Our Recommendations:

We anticipate that a large number of applicants will qualify as "corporate entities", thus incurring the increased official fees from 1st July 2019. We therefore recommend that where possible, all renewal fees for their patents and designs be paid upfront, before that deadline, so as to benefit from the existing flat fees.
